HOW TO GET TO LOGAN HILL

From Ithaca, take Route 96B south towards Danby and drive approximately 18 miles to Candor. Public parking at the preserve is limited as Logan Hill Road is a minimally maintained seasonal road, but you are welcome to park in the public parking area next to Candor High School. Visitors will then need to cross Main Street and walk up Water Street. Once past the village's water tower driveway, continue heading up Logan Hill Road for approximately 0.5 miles to the trailhead on the right. Look for yellow paint blazes.

Logan Hill Nature Preserve, bordering Catatonk Creek and the village of Candor, offers miles of hiking trails with stunning views of meadows, ponds, forests, and hillsides of the Southern Tier.

NATURAL HISTORY

Visitors can venture through young and old forests, grassland and meadow habitat, and an elevated wetland that hosts southern species such as tupelo and cucumber magnolia trees. Open fields host nesting Bobolinks; shrubby, successional areas provide a home to Prairie Warblers and Woodcock; and, dozens of man-made vernal pools provide excellent breeding grounds for wood frogs, salamanders, and other amphibians.

HISTORY

Betsy and Dick Darlington bought 300 acres of land atop Logan Hill in 1972, and generously donated 285 acres to the Land Trust in 2015. The remaining 15 acres are privately owned and are protected through a conservation easement. Please stay within the preserve boundaries.
