
## Paint Out 2017 11 Beautiful Places to Paint Outdoors

## **Directions from the Barrow Gallery:**

- **1. Charlie Major Nature Trail -** Head west on East Genesee Street toward State Street Road. Turn right onto Jordan Street. After about 1.5 miles, turn left onto Oneill Lane, the destination will be on the left.
- **2. Skaneateles Conservation Area** Head west on East Genesee Street toward State Street Road. Turn right onto Jordan Street. After about 1.5 miles, turn right onto Old Seneca Turnpike. Drive 2.5 miles and turn right onto Gully Road. There are multiple parking areas on Gully Road, including the trailhead for Guppy Falls (reached in about one mile). You can continue on Old Seneca Turnpike to the main parking area for the upper section, which includes a pond and observation deck.
- **3. Baltimore Woods Nature Center** ~ **4007 Bishop Hill Road** Head east on East Genesee Street and merge with Route **20** East. Follow Route **20** for approximately **2** miles and turn left onto Route **175** East. After about **2.5** miles, turn left onto Bishop Hill Road. The Baltimore Nature Center is located one mile down the road on the left.
- **4. Clift Park** Head west on East Genesee Street toward State Street Road. After about 1/4 mile, the destination will be on the left.
- **5. Thayer Park** Head east on East Genesee Street for approximately 350 feet, destination will be on the right.
- **6. Lockwood Lavender Farm** ~ **1682 West Lake Road (41A)** Head west on East Genesee Street toward State Street Road. After 1/2 mile, turn left onto Route 41A South. Follow 41A for 6.8 miles; the farm will be on the left.
- **7. Carpenter's Falls Unique Area** Head west on East Genesee Street toward State Street Road. After 1/2 mile, turn left onto Route 41A South. Follow 41A for 11 miles and turn left on Appletree Point Road. The parking area will be on the left. Follow trail upstream to Falls overlook.
- **8. Bahar Nature Preserve -** Head west on East Genesee Street toward State Street Road. After 1/2 mile, turn left onto Route 41A South. Follow 41A for 11 miles and turn left on Appletree Point Road. At the intersection of Appletree Point Road and Plunkie Point Road, bear left onto Appletree Point Road. Proceed 1/4 mile to parking area on the left where a trail leads to the lake.
- **9. Hinchcliff Family Preserve** Head east on East Genesee Street. After 1/2 mile, turn right onto Route 41 South for 14 miles to the intersection with Covey Road. Turn right on Covey Road and follow to the end, please be sure not to block the gate to the farm field.
- **10. Ripley Hill Nature Preserve -** Head east on East Genesee Street. After 1/2 mile, turn right onto Route 41 South. Follow Route 41 for about 13 miles. Turn left onto Cold Brook Road and then take the first right onto Ripley Hill Road. Follow Ripley Hill Road south for approximately 1.5 miles to a hilltop meadow. Although there are no hiking trails at Ripley Hill, the meadow can be painted from the unpaved road.
- **11. High Vista Nature Preserve -** Head east on East Genesee Street. After 1/2 mile, turn right onto Route 41 South. Follow Route 41 for about 15 miles and turn right on Vincent Hill Road at the Onondaga/Cortland County line in the Town of Scott. The parking area is on the right at a deep bend in the road. Walk down the road to find the preserve entrance on the left.

**The John D. Barrow Art Gallery** is a single-artist gallery containing the works of John D. Barrow (1824 -- 1906), a second generation Hudson River School style painter. The gallery opened October 8, 1900, beginning a wonderful cultural and historical legacy for the Skaneateles community. The primary entrance to the art gallery is through the Skaneateles Library; however, the gallery is a separate non-profit facility.
