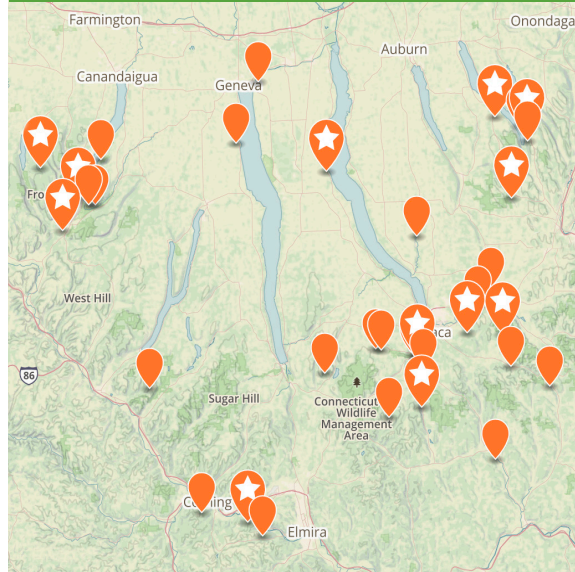

 **Acreage:** 140 acres

 **County:** Tompkins

 **Trails:** .6 miles

Follow the Finger Lakes Trail to the highest point of Summerland Farm Preserve and experience spectacular sweeping views of the landscape, extending 25 to 30 miles on a clear day.

NATURAL HISTORY

Within a large area of conserved lands including Potato Hill and Robinson Hollow state forests lies this stunning mix of forest and meadow. Bobolinks and Meadowlarks grace the grassland habitat here, and black bear have been observed roaming the hills. Remnants of old logging roads flow through the large stands of northern hardwood forest.

HISTORY

These acres were donated by Dr. Ann Boyer, a physician who also donated a conservation easement on an adjacent 15-acre parcel where she maintains a residence. The preserve name comes from fond memories of Dr. Boyer's childhood, when her grandmother moved the family to a country place that they called Summerland Farm. The cherished memory lives forever at this permanently protected conservation area.
